

# The conference

The Sahel & Sahara Interest Group (SSIG) was established in 2000 following a meeting organized by the Convention on Migratory Species in Djerba, Tunisia. The workshop led to the creation of the SSIG as an informal action and information-sharing forum to guide and monitor conservation efforts across the region.

Over the past 25 years, it has become a key annual gathering for professionals working in environment, conservation, and sustainable development across North Africa, the Sahel, and the Middle East.

Facilitated by Sahara Conservation, the meeting fosters collaboration and shared solutions to improve outcomes for biodiversity and society across the Sahara and the Sahel, from grassroots conservation initiatives to influencing national and international policy and decision-making.

It also supports the next generation of change-makers by enabling emerging conservation researchers and practitioners to engage with established leaders. Participants include a diverse range of stakeholders, from universities and research institutions to NGOs, museums, zoological institutions, and statutory and intergovernmental agencies.

## CONFERENCE THEME

On the road to UNCCD COP 17, the 2026 SSIG conference will promote the International Year of Rangelands and Pastoralists.

Covering about half the world's land, rangelands are home to unique biodiversity and pastoral communities whose livelihoods depend on them.

The meeting will be structured around the following cross-cutting themes, focused on the Sahara and the Sahel:

- **Restoring species:** biology, management and recovery of threatened species.
- **Sustaining ecosystems:** sustainable management, restoration and conservation of protected areas, with a focus on desert and rangelands.
- **Human/wildlife interactions & ecosystems health:** complementary approaches for communities, wildlife and livestock in a desertification context.

# The objectives

**Assess progress and set priorities:** review ongoing initiatives, measure impact, and develop a shared roadmap for future actions.

**Strengthen regional cooperation:** foster collaboration and best practices among key actors in the fields of environment, conservation, and sustainable development.

**Advocate for sustainable policies:** raise awareness among decision-makers on biodiversity, desertification and climate resilience.



**Exchange knowledge and innovations:** share scientific advancements, technologies, and innovative solutions tailored for sustainable management.

**Highlight local initiatives:** promote impactful community projects and strengthen local communities' capacities.

## Sahara Conservation

Sahara Conservation is an international non-profit organization dedicated to conserving and preserving the unique ecosystems and landscapes of the Sahara and the Sahel. Since 2004, we have been implementing initiatives to protect the Sahara's natural and cultural heritage, including the protection and reintroduction of threatened species, habitat conservation, and the management of protected areas. Sahara Conservation is a member of the International Union for Conservation of Nature and is present in Chad, Niger, France, and the United States.

## Arab Network for Environment and Development

The Arab Network for Environment and Development (RAED) is an international non-governmental organization established in 1990 and headquartered in Egypt. It is officially registered in the Egyptian Ministry of Social Solidarity since 2007. The organization operates throughout the Arab, Mediterranean and African regions, and focuses on environmental and sustainable development challenges, with emphasis on the Rio Conventions.

In 2026, the Wadis & Dunes Excellence Awards will be presented during the gala dinner, creating a flagship moment to honour achievement, share inspiring stories, and highlight leadership in arid-land conservation.

# Costs and funding

## Based on SSIG 2025 – 100 attendees

The overall cost of the event is estimated at USD 35,000 (see detailed chart below). Conference fees help cover about a third of these expenses.
